# Research Methods in Psychoanalysid PT 172 Fall 2020 Dr. Stephen Soldz

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## **Course Description**

This course provides a theoretical and practical knowledge of research methodology, including principles of concept formation and research design. The course will help students gain skills for reading and evaluating published research, as well as begin work on their disserations. Students review important tools, methods and techniques for sound quantitative and qualitative research, including methods applicable psychoanalytic studies of a variety of topics. Throughout, there is an emphasis on research ethics and the requirements of ethical research practice.

## **Objectives**

- 1. Students will acquire a preliminary understanding of social science research methodology.
- 2. Students will learn the differences between fixed and flexible research designs with special attention to establishing the trustworthiness of findings.
- 3. Students will learn to critically read and critique psychoanalytic research studies.
- 4. This course will describe techniques of qualitative research as applied to psychoanalytic topics.
- 5. Students will discuss the strengths and limitations of these methods.
- 6. Students will develop their dissertation research questions.
- 7. Students will begin their dissertation literature review.

### **Course Requirements**

A one-page log on your personal reactions to class is due before each class. This can contain anything you wish to communicate to me.

A one- page reading reaction is due for each class. Please try and summarize the key idea in the readings in 1-3 sentences. Then write about your thoughts on the topic, potential applications, critiques, limitations, etc.

All readings EXCEPT ROBSON BOOK are available on the BGSP website. You should also become familiar with <u>The Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association</u>, 6<sup>th</sup> edition, and/or abbreviated versions of it available on the internet.

A final paper is due at the last class which should be a draft of a section of your dissertation literature review. We will discuss this in class.
